Make Our School Playground Better!

Successful businessman Lindsay Fox once said, "If you believe you can make a difference, then you will make a difference. Believe in yourself, your family, and your community, and you will win." You and your classmates are a school family that is setting out to make a difference. Together, we will win by making our school a better place for everyone. In class, we have been learning about writing to persuade an audience. You have been asked to think about problems with your school and ways your school could be improved. The class has decided to help the school playground solve its problems with litter, graffiti, and overall appearance. So, let's get to work!

Project Tasks

- 1. First, in groups of four, investigate the playground for the problem you would like to target. Recording your observations of the problems in the playground using the "Observation Guide" will achieve this goal.
- 2. Next, your group needs to agree on the one problem you believe you could fix. Obtain the digital camera from the teacher to take pictures of the problem you have decided to focus on.
- 3. You will brainstorm with your group possible solutions to that problem. Your group will then research the solutions listed. Interview teachers and students in your school to get their points of view on the problem you are addressing. Record your questions and answers on the "Interviewing Guide" (page 134).
- 4. Design a new playground, which implements your solution. The design should include four elements of a new playground (for example, gardens, equipment, play areas, and trash receptacles). Include the design in your presentation. Create your design using digital photography, a model, or a sketch.
- 5. You will know you are finished with your research when you are able to put the following things into the presentation.
 - Problems with the school playground, including evidence
 - Your solution to the problems
 - A point of view from a teacher at the school
 - Points of view from students at the school
 - A plan to implement the solution
 - The cost for implementing the solution
 - A design of a new playground incorporating your solution to the problems

Keep record of these questions and prompts throughout the project using the "Task Sheet" (page 135).

6. You can choose what program to use to create your presentation. I would suggest two programs you have practiced with in the library and the computer lab: Animoto (https://animoto.com) and Prezi (https://prezi.com). However, your group can use another electronic format for your multimedia presentation that I (the teacher) approve.

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7. Once you have completed your presentation, save and email the link to me. I will then embed the videos or presentations in the classroom blog. I will arrange for the principal to come to the classroom so each group can present its project. It is your job to convince the principal that your solution needs to be implemented.
